1. What is your name, what office are you running for and why are you running for this position?	Declined to Respond	My name is Morgan Dixon and I am running for the Coeur d' Alene, ID City Council Seat #2. 2. How could our city be improved? Please provide your top 2-3 ideas. 3. What are your views on the rapid growth of North Idaho? How should the city council manage growth?	Declined to Respond	High density housing is an unfortunate evil that our town needs. However the way that our local construction companies are going about designing these facilities does not add value to this town. This is in part due to building restrictions in the county, and in part due to our council approving them. Since less than 2.8% of Coeur d'Alene exists unbuilt on, the damage has already been done in our city limits. Growth is good when done correctly, but Coeur d'Alene and other neighboring cities have failed to properly plan for the massive influx we have seen in the last year. This isn't a surprise as Idaho has been one of the fastest growing states for years now. It has been poorly executed which is why it has become the biggest topic of the election cycle. If growth was executed successfully this question would not be asked as your day to day life would not be impacted significantly. Re-electing those who made us ask this question in the first place is beyond me.	As previous stated the growth is having the biggest impact on our community. We are seeing it in our economy, housing costs, public safety, school capacities, traffic, taxes. 7. Do you believe access to city managed water and sewer should be increased to rural communities and why?	Declined to Respond	Managed water and sewer should be specific to each city. If someone is in the city limits and wants to be part of the city infrastructure then they should be. If someone chooses to live out of city limits it should not be the neighboring cities problem. It is a choice of the individual to not live where there is pre-existing water and sewage or where there can be access to it. The individual should weigh the benefits and drawbacks of living in a rural community.	For CDA I don't see that as an issue. However, I believe that citizens should be provided with opt in options.
8. How do you plan on keeping a healthy reserve fund but not raising taxes?	Declined to Respond	If I win city council I will become Idaho's youngest elected official. I can use the attention I gain to reclaim the funds taken by the state for the Idaho tourism fund. In addition to the state's 6% sales tax, Idaho charges a travel and convention tax of 2% to occupants of hotel and motel rooms, as well as private campgrounds and vacation home rentals. After winning I will use the attention I will inevitably get/create to get this tax money back to the city where it came from. Assuming 1.5 million tourists stay overnight in Coeur d'Alene for one night each year with a minimum hotel rate of \$71 a month, this fund would be another \$2,130,000. This is far more than the \$715K that is currently awarded. Instead of giving the state all that money we could increase CDA's personal tourism fund to \$1,000,000 and still have another \$1,130,000 available for other uses.	To maintain a healthy reserve fund. We need to cut some of the fluff spending. Like the arts as I have listed. During covid the council took federal money and put it toward spending that wasn't part of the regular budget. Now the taxpayers are stuck with the bill to continue this fluff spending. We need to update impact fees as they have not been updated since 2004 leaving the taxpayer carrying the burden of paying for the increase of public safety costs due to the rapid growth policies of the current council.

9. What is your opinion of the increased push for affordable housing?	Declined to Respond	Current legislation and ordinance are failing the city/county's citizens since it does not allow for innovation in housing, which would allow for more affordable housing options that don't affect home prices. Another issue to this is teaching people how to save to buy a house. With the FHA Loan all you need as a downpayment is \$17,500 for a \$500,000 house. The mortgage would be \$1700-\$2100 a month which is far lower than the typical rental cost in CDA which is around \$2,500 a month and easily goes over \$3,000 a month. We need to stop creating rental complexes that don't build one's Net Worth, and instead make innovative cheap houses that add value to the community.	The lies being told about housing is the cost is based on low inventory and that high-density housing equals affordable housing. The reality is that inventory has been low for years and renting is just as expensive as housing. The reality is that the current influx of wealth is what is raising the cost of housing. "Affordable" or low-income housing comes with the burdens on taxing districts and public safety. The low-income affordable housing is a short fix that benefits no one but the developer as the tax payers cover the difference and the developer makes the profit. It also creates a long-term damage to the stability to our community by promoting a transitional population leaving our city in the dumps 20 years from now.
10. How should the public's input be taken into consideration and implemented in the decision-making process?	Declined to Respond	Public opinion should absolutely be taken into consideration whether that is online polls, in person voting, or public forms. In my opinion the people will always choose correctly, and most politicians know that which is why they want to reduce your ability to choose leaders and restrict voting rights.	I believe in the concept of Citizen Servants and a bottom up form of governance. We are here to represent the public. I think that Council members should remain involved with the public at all times not just during campaign season. Meetings should be moved from time to time to accommodate a higher turnout of public input.
