3. What are the top three issues that you feel the legislature needs to address?	Declined to Respond	A. State government is growing too big. I want to work to reduce the size of government. B. As a legislator, I want to offer a constitutional amendment to the Idaho Constitution similar to the Tenth Amendment in the National Constitution limiting the power of state government to only powers enumerated in the state constitution. C. I also think we need protections for mandated medical treatments as I believe each citizen is sovereign over their own bodies. We need to hold various government actors accountable when they claim they have emergency powers. Declined to Respond	I would encourage as many educational choices as possible to create competition in education. Declined to Respond	When I previously served in the Legislature from 2004 until 2012, I had one of the most conservative voting records in the Legislature. Since 2004 until today, there were only 2 bills passed by the Legislature and signed into law that directly pushed back on the federal government. I authored both of them. These were House Bill 606 in 2008 and House Bill 343 in 2011.	Constituents' need to communicate with the elected representative using what ever method that works for them. I will not compromise on my core values of honesty & following the Constitution as our founders intended.
8. What is your definition of marriage?	Declined to Respond	The answer is simple; marriage is between a man and a woman.	Marriage is between a man & a woman.
9. In recent years, sexually explicit materials have invaded public schools and libraries. In your opinion are these materials appropriate for minors under 18 years old?	Declined to Respond	No, they are not appropriate. And there should be no exceptions for schools or for public libraries. What legislation would you recommend to prevent the property tax increases that are causing financial burden and forcing some owners out of their homes?</p>	<p>Declined to Respond</p>	<p>There are proposals for a Proposition 13 type ceiling on property taxes, but that will require a constitutional amendment. I will support such legislation while declaring a statewide moratorium on increasing property valuations while such a constitutional amendment works its way through the approval process. This problem is mostly fueled by the expansion of the money supply, which is a federal issue.</p>	<p>I see the problem but do not have a solution. I would be willing to listen and consider a solution fair to all.</p>
<p>12. In your opinion, should the House of Representatives and the Senate have their own attorney/legal representation apart from the Attorney General?</p>	<p>Declined to Respond</p>	<p>Yes. Using the state’s Attorney General to provide legal counsel to the Legislative Branch of our state government is a separation of powers issue. In practice, the Attorney General’s office and staff are biased toward the bureaucracy. In that role, they are often the gatekeeper that kills legislation that would benefit the people of Idaho, but is not favored by the bureaucracy. I complained about this so much when I was a member of the House, that the House created an annual budget of \$200,000 for outside legal counsel. We need to go a step further where the Legislature has its own on-staff legal counsel.</p>	<p>No, the attorney general is the lawyer for the State</p>
<p>13. In recent years some groups have advocated for legalizing marijuana in our state, do you support or oppose the legalization of marijuana? Why or why not?</p>	<p>Declined to Respond</p>	<p>I support legalizing medical marijuana when it can be shown it is the best option in individual cases. However, there needs to be sideboards on such a policy since there are now dozens of different laboratory enhanced varieties of marijuana that go far beyond what is needed for medical purposes.</p>	<p>Here you are looking for an answer to the drug problems. This problem has existed before Christ I do not believe a solution for the problem will come from legislation.</p>

Declined to Respond	<p>I have a bachelors degree in Civil Engineering from the University of Utah and an MBA from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania. I own Alpine Engineering, a firm that does structural engineering and civil engineering. I am licensed as a Professional Engineer in about a dozen states. I am also MSHA certified for open-pit mining. I have lived in Coeur d'Alene, Athol and now Kellogg since 1995. I have lived in the new Legislative District 2 for 24 years.</p> <p>I served seven years on the Board of the Remington Water District in the Athol area. I also served nine years on the Board of the United Precious Metals Association. See upma.org. From 2004 until 2012 I was a member of the Idaho House of Representatives representing the north and east areas of Kootenai County. My voting record was both socially and fiscally conservative. I also authored and successfully ran legislation that was conservative in nature. Since 2004 until today, the Idaho Legislature has passed only 2 bills that were signed into law that directly pushed back on the federal government. I was the author of both those bills.
