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4. What do you consider the biggest health care issue for Idaho, and where do you stand on it?	Declined to Respond	Reducing the administrative encumbrances for our Medicare and Medicaid programs. I work closely with behavioral health professionals, many of whom will not accept those programs because of the administrative burdens of that program, specifically that for a one hour session with a patient requires two hours of paperwork to receive payment. This leaves persons who have the most difficult behavioral health issues with no way to get the care they need. Our rural counties are not able to recruit obstetricians and gynecologists to fill positions at their remote hospitals due to our abortion laws. I agree that abortion should be restrictive and should be restricted to those instances where there is significant risk to the life of the mother. There needs to be clarification in the language regarding abortion (e.g. removing an ectopic pregnancy is not an "abortion" in the moral sense, though it is termed an abortive procedure). We may need to explore pathways to minimize risk for doctors who are genuinely trying to minimize risk for doctors who are genuinely trying to minimize risk to life of their patients. This may look like presenting the case in real-time to a disinterested magistrate to review the facts of the case and approve the procedure should complications continue to escalate. This would minimize the legal risk to the physician, in much the same way we minimize risk to police officers seeking a warrant for someone's arrest or to search someone's property.
