What is your name, what office are you running for and why are you running for this position?</p> | <p>No Response Received</p> | <p>Spencer Hutchings I want to serve the citizens of Bonner County. My extensive background in finance, leadership, and the core principles of integrity and truth make me ideal for this role.</p> | <p>My name is Roger Rudd. Please provide your top 2-3 ideas.</p> | <p>No Response Received</p> | <p>Evaluate and streamline workflows: I will personally review every procedure, meet one-on-one with all staff to hear their ideas, and implement practical changes that improve work-life balance while delivering faster, more efficient, and higher-quality service to Bonner County citizens.</p> <p>Boost transparency: Create a public dashboard on the Clerk's website with clear metrics, processing times, and election data, plus regular updates at commissioner meetings so citizens always know exactly what's happening.</p> <p>Restore professional relationships: Lead by example with respectful, private handling of disagreements to end public drama and rebuild trust across county government.</p> | <p>The Clerk's office under Mike Rosedale has been well run, and I intend to build on that foundation. That said, every organization has room to improve. My top priorities:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Transparency in financials. As ex-officio Auditor, I will make budget and expenditure information more accessible and understandable to the average Bonner County resident, not just those who already know how to navigate government websites. 2. Continuous staff development. A 40-person office is only as good as its people. I will invest in cross-training deputies across all five functional areas, so the office is resilient with no single point of failure, no gaps in service when someone is out. 3. Election process communication. Voter confidence is earned, not assumed. I will improve how the office communicates with the public before, during, and after each election with plain language explanations of how ballots are processed, results certified, and audits conducted. | <p>3. Election integrity has become a serious concern for voters. How will you preserve election integrity to the highest level?</p> | <p>No Response Received</p> | <p>Election integrity is my top priority as Clerk. I will preserve it at the highest level by: Immediately auditing voter rolls to remove ineligible entries and keep them accurate and current. Strengthening chain-of-custody protocols for ballots and equipment with full bipartisan observation and verification at every step. Maximizing lawful observer access, enforcing voter ID, and providing enhanced fraud-prevention training for poll workers. Conducting transparent post-election audits and publicly reporting the results. As a U.S. Marine and business owner, I will run secure, trustworthy elections with zero compromise.</p> | <p>Election integrity is a statutory responsibility. As Chief Elections Officer, the Clerk is solely accountable for how Bonner County conducts its elections. My approach rests on three pillars: 1. Follow the law. Execute Idaho election law precisely and impartially no improvising, no outside pressure, no shortcuts. Every procedure and certification will comply with Idaho Code Title 34 and federal requirements. 2. Apply best practices. The law is the floor, not the ceiling. Rigorous chain-of-custody, post-election audits, accurate voter rolls, and fully documented processes that can withstand public scrutiny. 3. High-caliber volunteers. I will recruit capable, trained, civic-minded Bonner County residents as poll workers, people who understand they are guardians of the process, not just filling a seat. Voter confidence is earned through consistent, transparent, lawful execution, every election and every time.</p> |

As AI continues to advance in capabilities and is more frequently being used by hackers, what would you do to protect election infrastructure against fraud?</p> | <p>No Response Received</p> | <p>Election integrity includes protecting our systems from modern threats like AI powered hacking and disinformation. As Clerk, I will: Ensure all voting equipment and tabulation systems remain air-gapped from the internet and undergo regular independent cybersecurity audits. Require verifiable paper ballots with risk-limiting audits to confirm machine results and prevent any digital manipulation. Expand poll-worker and staff training to include recognition of AI-generated deepfakes, false ballots, and cyber threats. Maintain full bipartisan observer access to every stage of the process so citizens can see the safeguards in action.</p> | <p>The Clerk is not an IT or cybersecurity expert, and I won't pretend otherwise. I will ensure the office leverages every available resource, county IT, the Idaho Secretary of State's office, and federal partners like CISA who are trained and resourced to protect election infrastructure. The expertise exists; the Clerk's job is to make sure it is engaged and applied. What I bring is a military background in planning and risk management. I will apply that discipline by conducting tabletop exercises before each election cycle primary, general, and special stress-testing our procedures, exposing vulnerabilities, and closing gaps before they become failures. AI-assisted attacks are real and evolving, but the fundamentals haven't changed: know your vulnerabilities, train your people, test your systems, and have a plan when something goes wrong. That is exactly what I intend to do.</p> |

Our county is growing very rapidly, where do you see we need to improve election infrastructure and what are your suggestions? | No Response Received | <p>Rapid growth in Bonner County means more voters and higher election volume, so we must scale infrastructure without compromising integrity. As Clerk, I will:</p> <p>Conduct regular voter roll audits to keep lists accurate and current as our population changes.</p> <p>Streamline election workflows and add capacity, more efficient processing, additional poll sites if needed, and upgraded equipment to eliminate backlogs and reduce wait times for all residents.</p> <p>Maintain ironclad security with strengthened chain-of-custody, full bipartisan observation, and enhanced poll-worker training scaled to our growing needs.</p> | <p>Rapid growth means more voters, more ballots, and more demand on every aspect of elections. Infrastructure must keep pace.</p> <p>Polling locations. Evaluate whether current locations are adequate in number and accessibility as population spreads across the county.</p> <p>Voter roll maintenance. Growth brings new registrations and address changes. Rigorous, continuous maintenance is essential to accuracy and public confidence.</p> <p>Poll worker pipeline. More voters means more volunteers needed. I will build a recruitment and training program to ensure we always have capable, prepared poll workers ready.</p> <p>Growth is manageable but only with proactive planning. They are the most secure and transparent method since every ballot can be physically audited, hand-counted if needed, and verified through risk limiting audits.</p> <p>Paper ballots create an unbreakable trail that protects against hacking, AI driven manipulation, or equipment failure.</p> <p>Paper ballots allow full bipartisan observer access and chain-of-custody verification at every stage, exactly what I will enforce as Clerk.</p> <p>Electronic systems can assist with marking or tabulation, but only when they produce a verifiable paper ballot. Secure, auditable paper ballots are the gold standard for election integrity.</p> | <p>Bonner County uses paper ballots tabulated electronically, and I believe this is the right approach. Paper ballots provide a tangible, verifiable record that voters can trust. Electronic tabulation delivers speed and accuracy. Together they offer the best of both: efficiency without sacrificing transparency.</p> <p>Critically, paper ballots are retained for a legally specified period, preserving the ability to conduct a physical audit at any time. That auditability is essential to public confidence. If questions arise, the paper is there.</p> <p>I would maintain this system and ensure it continues to be administered with the rigor and transparency Bonner County voters deserve.</p> |
| 7. Do you support or oppose requirements for developers to pay for community infrastructure? | No Response Received | <p>I support requirements for developers to pay for the community infrastructure their projects require. Rapid growth should never burden existing Bonner County residents with higher taxes or strained roads, utilities, schools, and services. Developers must cover the full cost of new infrastructure; water, sewer, roads, and traffic improvements so current taxpayers are not subsidizing their profits. This ensures responsible, limited growth that enhances our community without overwhelming infrastructure or eroding our rural way of life, exactly as I outlined in my priorities for protecting Bonner County families.</p> | <p>This question falls outside the statutory roles of the Bonner County Clerk. The Clerk's office does not set development policy or infrastructure requirements; those decisions rest with the Board of County Commissioners and other appropriate authorities.</p> <p>On a personal note: my answer is it depends. Large developments place real demands on existing roads, services, and support systems, and it is reasonable to expect developers to help shoulder that burden. Smaller developments inside already served areas warrant a different calculus. Context matters, and any decision should be made thoughtfully with the community's best interests in mind.</p> |

| 8. In your opinion, what does the Clerk provide in terms of checks and balances in regard to the other elected officials? | No Response Received | In my opinion, the County Clerk provides essential checks and balances as an independently elected officer under Idaho Code Title 31. As the Bonner County ex officio auditor, I will oversee county finances, ensure budget compliance, sign all warrants, and maintain accurate accounts, preventing unchecked spending by the Board or other officials. As ex officio clerk of the Board, I will record all proceedings, resolutions, votes, and financial decisions, creating a permanent, transparent public record. As Chief Elections Officer, I will guarantee fair, secure elections for every official. This structure upholds Dillon’s Rule, promotes accountability, and protects taxpayer dollars and longtime residents. I will fulfill these duties with total transparency. | The Clerk serves in the executive branch of county government and plays a direct role in fiscal checks and balances. As ex-officio County Auditor, the Clerk monitors every department's compliance with the BOCC-approved budget by tracking revenues, expenditures, fees, petty cash, and grants to ensure spending stays within authorized limits. This means no department, regardless of who leads it, operates without financial oversight from the Clerk's office. That independence is by design, and it protects taxpayers and ensures accountability across all of county government. |
| 9. How would you utilize the budget that you manage while being fiscally responsible? | No Response Received | As Clerk I will manage the office budget with strict fiscal responsibility by: Immediately reviewing every expenditure and workflow in my first 100 days to eliminate waste and inefficiencies. Prioritizing smart, targeted investments that streamline services, reduce backlogs, and improve election security and transparency, never spending more than necessary. Delivering better work-life balance for staff while controlling costs so taxpayer dollars go directly to faster, higher quality service for citizens. | 10. What is your view on eliminating the property tax in favor of a higher sales tax? | No Response Received | I have strongly supported eliminating the property tax in favor of a higher sales tax for many years, and I’m glad state leaders are finally catching up. Property taxes unfairly burden the homeowners, veterans, and fixed-income families who built Bonner County, especially as growth drives up valuations. Shifting to a consumption based sales tax is fairer, encourages economic growth, and protects our rural way of life without punishing property ownership. As Clerk, I will continue managing the county budget with ironclad fiscal responsibility no matter what tax system the state adopts. | This question falls outside the statutory role of the Bonner County Clerk, whose office administers the budget process but does not set tax policy that authority rests with the Legislature and the BOCC. On a personal note: I believe property taxes should be eliminated. Requiring citizens to make annual payments to the government on property they already own with after-tax dollars is fundamentally at odds with true private ownership. It amounts to paying rent to the government indefinitely, and that conflicts with the basic American right to pursue happiness and build lasting wealth. |

As the county's population continues to grow, do you believe the Clerk's office currently has sufficient funds to operate efficiently? | No Response Received | I believe the Clerk's office must operate efficiently as Bonner County grows, but I won't assume we currently have sufficient funds without facts. I have held a Top Secret/Sensitive Compartmented Information (TS/SCI) clearance, a rigorous vetting process that reflects the same standard of integrity and trustworthiness the Clerk's office demands. Throughout my career I managed multimillion-dollar budgets, oversaw large and diverse teams, and created, tracked, and indexed critical documents under strict compliance requirements. I retired as a Lieutenant Colonel, the highest rank available on my career path having led organizations far larger and more complex than the Clerk's office.
