Third, defense of the traditional family of father, mother, and their children, while preserving the parents' authority over their children (and not having that authority undermined by government institutions) is a cornerstone of social cohesion.

No Response Received	Yes, besides electing people with integrity and conservative values to office, holding those elected officials accountable is the main part of a precinct committeeman's job. I do this by (1) asking questions of elected officials and listening to them explain their duties and their decisions; and (2) communicating this knowledge publicly, whether in public forums or individually through my contact with citizens of my precinct.
